## **Vision**

## **Mission**

We are a scientific community that nurtures reflexivity, courage, and a critical approach in research and engaged action. We create interdisciplinary and internationally relevant knowledge.

We conceive and implement research along social trajectories, actively striving for change from the status quo.

We endeavour to build an open, solidarity-based, and responsible community of researchers of the highest integrity.

By insisting on the autonomy of universities, we defend academic freedom at all stages of research as a prerequisite for questioning established knowledge and providing new scientific insights.

Convinced of the importance of the public role of social sciences and humanities, we continuously share scientific knowledge with the wider public and encourage critical reflection on society.

## IFDT in History

The Institute for Philosophy and Social Theory was founded in 1992, following the independence of the Centre for Philosophy and Social Theory established in 1981 under the auspices of the Institute of Social Sciences in Belgrade. The founders of the Centre were Belgrade Praxis philosophers, eight professors from the Faculty of Philosophy in Belgrade who were labelled as a dissident group by the authorities, especially after the student protests of 1968, and were consequently removed from the faculty. After being excluded from the University of Belgrade by an (unconstitutional) decision of the assembly to “put them at disposal” in 1975, they turned to both domestic and international public opinion and filed lawsuits with the Constitutional Court. Eventually, pressure from the international intellectual community, particularly the International Labor Organization, bore fruit, and in 1981, a decision was made for them to be reinstated at the university. Thus, the Centre for Philosophy and Social Theory was established within the framework of the Institute of Social Sciences, which was affiliated with the University of Belgrade.

From the beginning, the Centre for Philosophy and Social Theory constituted itself as a **counter-institution**. On the one hand, it was part of the institutional apparatus, as it was established as part of the Institute of Social Sciences controlled by party decisions, while on the other hand, it was oriented towards critical reflection and the possibility of modifying these institutions, towards their change. The concept of engagement and its practical application thus formed the basis of the institute’s work from the very beginning and shaped the life of the Institute. The Institute emerged as a product of socio-political events, being their witness, critic, and participant. The founders’ message that theory can never be separated from practice, implying that theory is built through engaged interaction with the social reality in which we live, coupled with the seemingly contradictory proposition that practice is based on theoretical critical reflection and arises from it, or that theory implies practice – is a motto that still reflects the work of the Institute today.

## IFDT Today

The Institute is a vibrant community of 73 researchers and 14 support staff, that focuses on research and development in social and humanistic sciences, complemented by activities like publishing and organizing public events. It prioritizes international collaboration to enrich research quality and global influence. Through its nine specialized laboratories, it fosters multiperspective and interdisciplinary research, attracting scholars from the region. Committed to enhancing academic standards, it promotes engagement studies for social change and emphasizes the public role of theory. Collaborations with diverse sectors facilitate the effective dissemination of critical research findings.

The Institute is dedicated to the development of **engagement studies through the prism of social change**. The themes that laboratories as research units bring into this research focus primarily relate to social and political movements in the public sphere that strive for active change from the current state, as well as the power of individuals and communities. In the context of (re)vision of

the possibilities and consequences of social change, key questions concern the effectiveness of engagement, emancipation, (boundaries of) solidarity, and (character of) resistance. In addition to the engaged perspective regarding social change, the Institute also considers historical and contemporary circumstances that obstruct their path, with the belief that such understanding can contribute to alternative forms of contemporary action and thought. Finally, the Institute pays special attention to the public role of theory and engaged knowledge transfer, seeking to make the main findings of its research accessible and understandable to a wider audience. The increased demand for critical, objective, and fact-based research in various spheres of public policy provides an opportunity for closer collaboration with the media, for-profit and nonprofit sectors, as well as decision-makers.

## **IFDT in the World**

International collaboration is an important element of the Institute's work, facilitating the exchange of experiences and resources with other research institutions and universities. Through participation in global networking, the Institute creates opportunities for joint research efforts, thereby increasing its international influence. This approach enriches the process and results of the Institute's research, making it relevant and beneficial in a broader social context.

The Institute operates within several international networks, among which we would highlight as the most significant: the Open Society University Network (OSUN), the CIRCLE U European University Alliance, the International Consortium of Critical Theory Programs (ICCTP), the Consortium of Humanities Centers and Institutes (CHCI), the European Consortium for Political Research (ECPR), and the European Communication Research and Education Association (ECREA).

## **IFDT International Scientific Board**

The International Scientific Advisory Board was established in March 2021 with the aim of strengthening the Institute's cooperation with the leading names in global theoretical thought in the fields of philosophy and social theory. Since the Institute has often faced political pressures during its history (turbulent for a scientific institution), influential world thinkers have repeatedly supported the efforts in protecting institutional autonomy and freedom of the IFDT through petitions, appeals and open letters.

The international scientific board has an advisory function and through its activities secures global relevance and visibility of the Institute, and additionally positions the IPST as an internationally recognized and influential institution in the field of social theory and engaged thought. The work of the International Advisory Scientific Committee is coordinated by Petar Bojanić in the capacity of a delegated representative of the Scientific Board of the Institute for Philosophy and Social Theory.

## RESEARCH

### Research Labs

#### **The Educational Theories Lab**

**[EduLab]** critically examines various forms, history, and philosophical foundations of education. The lab explores the emergence and evolution of educational ideas and their implementation in contemporary policies and strategies. It involves experts from philosophy, sociology, psychology, pedagogy, political science, anthropology, adult education, and literary theory. EduLab aims to contribute to education improvement through research, collaboration, and public engagement.

#### **The Digital Society Lab**

**[DigiLab]** investigates the diverse impacts of new technologies on individuals and society. Beyond research, it hosts the annual EMERGE event, comprising a scientific conference and forum that brings together academic and non-academic communities. DigiLab also organizes an online lecture series “The Future of Artificial Intelligence: Social and Cultural Aspects” with international experts. Lab members contribute to technology policy-making and maintain connections to relevant stakeholders on the national and international level.



### **The Gender Research Lab**

**[GenLab]** tracks, theorizes, and investigates global and local events related to anti-gender policies through interdisciplinary and applied research. GenLab collaborates with university centers, especially in the Southeast European region, and has established the Regional Network for Gender and Policy Research in Southeast Europe (GenPolSEE). It focuses on improving the status of academic women and networking through initiatives like the United for Knowledge network and the UNIGEM project “University and Gender Mainstreaming.”

### **The Holocaust Studies Lab**

**[ShoahLab]** examines Holocaust and genocide issues, aiming to produce new knowledge, establish international collaboration, and develop educational programs for undergraduate, master’s, and doctoral students. ShoahLab’s multidisciplinary nature involves scholars and experts from history, philosophy, sociology, visual arts, literature, museology, education, and librarianship. Through various activities, ShoahLab aims to become a recognized scientific unit internationally and a leading one in the region, focusing on Holocaust and genocide issues.

### **The Philanthropy, Solidarity, and Care Studies Lab**

**[SolidCareLab]** conducts interdisciplinary research and reflection on the concepts and practices of philanthropy, solidarity, and care. Through rigorous empirical and theoretical research, educational initiatives, and collaboration with academic institutions, civil society, and governmental bodies, SolidCareLab aims to shed light on the dimensions, roles, and status of philanthropy, solidarity, and care in contemporary societies, considering their historical significance and today’s challenges.

### **The Active Citizenship and Democratic Innovations Lab**

**[ActiveLab]** employs interdisciplinary approaches to study institutional and non-institutional citizen participation. ActiveLab focuses on various models of participatory, deliberative, and agonistic democracy and their significance for democratic society development. The lab emerges from years of continuous scientific research and analysis, with members actively participating in applied projects and international collaborations with various scientific and professional networks in the fields of humanities, social, and political sciences.

### **The Social Critique Lab**

[**CriticLab**] brings together researchers from diverse disciplinary backgrounds and theoretical orientations to study and practice social critique. Drawing on engaged thought traditions from antiquity to the present, CriticLab members seek to expose competing models of societal critique, examining their foundation, scope, significance, influence, and impact. Through research activities, CriticLab analyzes global and domestic examples of social critique, confronting their mutual contributions and formulating enhanced modalities of societal critique in terms of argumentation grounding and extra-theoretical consequences.

### **The Lab for Theory, Creation, and Politics of Space**

[**PerspectLab**] conducts interdisciplinary research on space, with members from philosophy, architecture, art history, urbanism, sociology, and anthropology. Lab study space creation, (in)justice, citizen participation, housing, segregation, gentrification, privatization, communal living in cities, cultural heritage, and the environment. With a focus on holistic urban dynamics, lab members engage in applied projects, scientific research, and production. They co-organize events like the “Architectural Summer in

the Moise Palace” in Cres, Croatia, and specialized Summer Schools such as “Water Landscapes: Heritage and the Environment” and “Architecture and Philosophy”.

### **The Socialist and (Post-)Yugoslav Studies Lab**

[**YugoLab**] is a multidisciplinary collective including historians, sociologists, political scientists, anthropologists, theorists, and other experts in social and humanistic sciences. Its work focuses on two key aspects: studying socialism as a historical phenomenon and considering alternatives to current dominant models of social thought and domination. Additionally, the laboratory researches the Yugoslav state and society in the 20th century, with a particular emphasis on the second half of the century, exploring its social, political, and cultural aspects.

## Selected Research Projects

**EnTrust - Enlightened trust: An examination of trust and distrust in governance – conditions, effects and remedies** is funded by Horizon 2020. EnTrust seeks to deepen our understanding of trust in governance, fostering sustainable and democratic societies in Europe. Through a multidisciplinary approach, it aims to illuminate the dynamic relationship between trust and distrust, generating empirical insights across various levels of governance and promoting best practices for cultivating enlightened trust.

**TWON - Exploring the Influence of Social Media on Democracy Using Digital Twins** funded through Horizon 2020. The project is investigating the impacts of social networks on democratic discourse through the EU-funded TWON (Twin of Online Social Networks) project. The end goal is to provide the European Commission with strategic suggestions for possible technology company or platform operator regulations.

**Nets4Dem - The Network of Networks for Democracy**, funded by Horizon Europe. Nets4Dem puts forward a Network of Networks approach to establish and develop a

European network of practitioners and researchers in the field of democracy, civic deliberation, participation and citizenship education. The unique approach that Nets4Dem puts forward is to ‘weave’ more and better connections between existing actors and networks already active in the wider democracy field, taking advantage of each other’s strengths and reducing duplication.

**Creating Life Champions (LC2023)**: A program under Erasmus+ aimed at reinforcement of positive social values and principles, by using the specific setting for their dissemination – sports field, the specific target group for promoting them – football trainers and specific methods involved – non-formal education in and through sports.

**Intersubjectivity of Affects and Social Change**, supported by the Independent Social Research Foundation, focuses on a theoretical insight into the processes through which political affects could become intersubjective and create a potential for social change, particularly in the context of major societal crises such as the 2008 financial meltdown or the Covid-19 pandemic.

**UNIGEM - University and gender mainstreaming** project is supported by the Government of the United

Kingdom and Northern Ireland. Its main goal is to design gender-responsive and gender-sensitive policies in higher education, establish gender equality bodies in academic institutions, integrate gender equality themes in university curricula, and sensitize faculty, students, and administrative staff to gender equality and fight against gender-based violence.

**Introducing the First Holocaust and Genocide Studies MA Program in Serbia:** This initiative, funded by the US Embassy, aims to introduce the first MA program in Holocaust and Genocide Studies in Serbia. The project aims to exchange knowledge between the U.S. and Serbia, bringing experience of Serbia to USA on the Holocaust, Roma genocide, and Serbian history, while bringing awareness to Serbia about Holocaust research and combating racism from U.S. experiences.

**“Assessing Neoplatonism in the 14th and 15th century Balkans”** is supported by the Science Fund of the Republic of Serbia. The project examines how the Neoplatonic metaphysics shaped the Christian and Islamic traditions by focusing on its influence on theological and philosophical doctrines, religious practices, artistic and architectural expressions, and medical procedures.

**Distributed Archiving at IFDT** was supported by Filecoin Foundation for the Decentralized Web. The project set the grounds for collecting, digitizing, preserving, interpreting, and distributing information related to cultural heritage that various political and cultural authorities have treated as “undesirable” or “unworthy” of support.

## ACTIVITIES

## ANNUAL AWARDS



Drawing upon the legacy of the Praxis School as a field of engaged thought, the Institute has placed studies of engagement at the centre of its research activities. Therefore, the Institute established two annual awards in memory of its engaged founders, Miladin Životić and Zagorka Golubović.

**Miladin Životić Award for Critical Engagement** is bestowed for critical engagement to leading theorists whose activity has produced notable critical resonance in social practice. This award is granted to exceptional individuals who are always ahead of others, striving for progress and change, spurred by the urgency of the moment and the desire to outpace forces that erode communities.

Previous recipients of the award include Judith Butler (2018), Axel





Honneth (2019), Étienne Balibar (2020), Jonathan Wolff (2021) and Maurizio Ferraris (2022).

**Thomas Piketty**, professor at the School of Advanced Studies in Social Sciences (EHESS) and the Paris School of Economics (PSE) has received an **award for the year 2023**, as an influential voice from the scientific field who continues to inspire and initiate debates in public discussions that transcend national and disciplinary boundaries as well as that shape the course of our societies.

**Zagorka Golubović Early Career Engaged Research Award** has been presented annually for the scholarly work of young researchers who approach regional or broader social issues in an engaged manner.

Violeta Tadić, a research intern at the Institute for Educational Research in Belgrade, is the laureate of the annual “Zagorka Golubović” Award for 2023. Tadić’s paper, “On the Approaches to the Defining and Operationalization of the Concept of School Safety,” published in the scientific journal *Nastava i vaspitanje* 71(2), was commended for its comprehensive examination of school security as a multifaceted social issue.

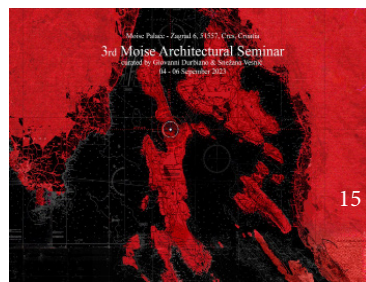

**EMERGE 2023 Forum:**  
Aligning AGI for Humanity's Future



IFDT hosted a total of 102 events that spanned a diverse range of themes and initiatives. Among them, several standout collaborations and conferences left a lasting imprint on our academic landscape.

Partnering with the Faculty of Media and Communications, we orchestrated the immersive 2023 Deleuze and Guattari Studies Conference and Camp, drawing in 225 participants over five days, accompanied by seven stimulating invited lectures.

We convened the inaugural conference dedicated to women in the Holocaust, in collaboration with WHISC – Women in the Holocaust International Study Center of the The Moreshet Mordechai Anielewicz Memorial Holocaust Study and Research Center – Givat Haviva, Israel, and NGO Haver Serbia. Over the course of three enlightening days, more than 30 presentations shed light on the often-overlooked narratives of women during one of history’s darkest chapters.

Our commitment to fostering dialogue and critical inquiry extended to hosting the traditional EMERGE forum/conference, a collaborative event that continues to inspire exchanges and interdisciplinary collaboration on digital society.

We organized a series of panel discussions dedicated to honoring the legacy of Zoran Đinđić, exploring his political achievements, philosophical insights, and Serbia’s foreign policy orientation.

In reaction to horrific events of mass shooting in elementary school in Belgrade, we have organized two round table discussions delving into pressing societal issues such as violence in the media and the developmental needs of children and youth today.

IFDT also facilitated six workshops, including the thought-provoking “Balkan Talks on War and Peace,” which convened international scholars and practitioners to explore pathways towards reconciliation and conflict resolution in the region.

Beyond conferences and workshops, the IFDT took proactive steps to educate future generations, initiating courses on the Holocaust for undergraduate, master’s, and doctoral students, fostering a deeper understanding of this pivotal moment in history. Furthermore, our commitment to education activities for younger generations extended to hosting several summer schools, including the traditional “Water Landscapes: Heritage and Environment” and “Summer School of Engagement and Democ-

racy (ANDEM),” providing learning experiences that empower individuals to engage meaningfully in challenging Balkanise environment.

## PODCAST “Sound of Thoughts”



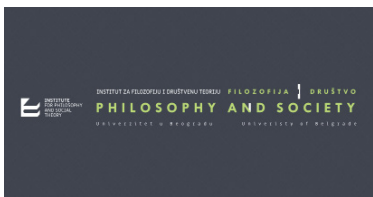

## Journals

**Philosophy and Society** is a peer-reviewed, open-access academic journal established in 1987 by members of the Belgrade *Praxis Group*. Today, it is published by the Institute for Philosophy and Social Theory, University of Belgrade on a quarterly basis. Since its inception, the journal has welcomed contributions from established international academics: the first issue of *Philosophy and Society* featured articles by Albrecht Wellmer and Richard J. Bernstein, while the most recent issues include contributions from T. M. Scanlon, Otfried Höffe, Jean-Luc Marion, Judith Butler, Hauke Brunkhorst, Kennet R. Westphal, Hans Bernhard Schmid, Maurizio Ferraris, Dan Zahavi, Paul Cobben, and other renowned philosophers and social theorists.



**Kritika: Journal for Philosophy and Theory of Society** is a peer-reviewed academic journal with open access. Founded in 2020, it is issued biannually in electronic format in the Serbian language. The journal aims to present leading trends in

contemporary philosophy and social theory and stimulate further research in the fields of humanities and social sciences. Its goal is to advance creative and critical thinking and provide a platform for informed debate.



**Khōrein: Journal for Architecture and Philosophy** is an open access, peer-reviewed journal published biannually by the Institute for Philosophy and Social Theory, University of Belgrade. The journal strives to deepen the dialogue between architecture and philosophy, even erase or transcend the boundary between the two disciplines. In order to arrive at such an epistemology of architecture, articles published will contribute to both an architectural vocabulary and broader theory by defining and problematizing key concepts and protocols that straddle and traverse these fields of inquiry.
